County	Action	Priority
Full Council	Advocacy	1. Identify opportunities for the County to engage in <u>establishing a living wage and safe working conditions</u> for all <u>food service</u> and <u>seasonal/migrant farm workers</u> .
Zoning & Land Use	Advocacy	2. Coordinate with municipal planning departments to <u>stress the importance of including food systems</u> as part of the <u>Master Planning Process</u> . 3. Place an emphasis on food system development in the countywide <u>economic development strategy</u> , utilizing SPARK and other county resources to ensure <u>siting and investment</u> of food system infrastructure in a <u>systematic and deliberate way</u> .
Farmers & Purchasing	Standards	4. Support change to the <u>County Procurement Policy</u> to give preference to <u>locally grown, processed, and prepared foods</u> , local goods and services, with an aim of the County and its vendors purchasing <u>20% of food products locally</u> by 2020.
Waste & Packaging	Standards	5. Amend the Environmentally Preferred Purchasing section of the <u>County Procurement Policy</u> to <u>mandate the purchase of</u> foodservice ware and packaging that is <u>reusable, compostable, or recyclable</u> . Require funds to be allocated for the education and resource development of County purchasing staff as well as for adequate recycling and composting containers and services at every county building.
Full Council	Guidelines	6. Develop system to examine and provide opportunities to utilize foreclosed/vacant/abandoned land in the food system.
Waste & Packaging	Advocacy	7. Advocate that municipalities implement a <u>landfill ban on commercial and institutional organic material</u> generated within 20 miles of a composting facility or anaerobic digester.

Access & Nutrition	Advocacy	8. Ensure the preservation of funding, and respond to changes to eligibility guidelines to <u>reduce enrollment barriers</u> for food assistance programs.
Farmers & Purchasing	Advocacy	9. Identify and support opportunities and alternative models that <u>reduce barriers for small farmers</u> to participate in the marketplace. 10. Identify and support programs and policies that <u>increase access to capital for local farmers and food producers</u> , particularly beginning and historically under represented farmers.

Full Council	Advocacy	11. Recommend and support that institutions within the county take measures to <u>preserve our essential pollinator populations</u> by utilizing <u>pesticide free grounds management practices</u> . 12. Encourage institutions to adopt policies and practices leading to the purchase 20% of food products locally by 2020.
Access & Nutrition	Guidelines	13. Recommend and support that institutions within the county <u>establish policies and implement environmental</u> and organizational changes that increase the <u>availability, affordability and sensory appeal of nutritious</u> and, when possible, local and sustainable food.

Zoning & Land Use	Standards	14. Coordinate across municipalities to establish <u>recommendations</u> and standards regarding <u>need, timing, siting, and market saturation</u> of farmers markets. Establish recommended <u>zoning best practices</u> that <u>address access, scale, location, infrastructure, services, and waste management</u> .
Access & Nutrition	Advocacy	15. Encourage municipal planning offices to consider food access in transportation decision making, while encouraging transportation providers to provide <u>coordinated and connected transportation</u> to food access sites (including, but not limited to, grocery stores, farmers markets, and food pantries etc.).
Waste & Packaging	Standards	16. Establish policies around the <u>donation of surplus food</u> ; encourage municipalities to <u>require donation of surplus food</u> from department purchasing and community events in accordance with food safety regulations. 17. Set goals and standards for municipal sanctioned events to be <u>zero waste compliant</u> . 18. Provide model <u>solid waste ordinance language</u> to encourage all municipalities to include a <u>commercial and residential organics collection program</u> through public or private vendor services.
Zoning & Land Use	Standards	19. Provide model ordinance language around <u>mobile food vending</u> throughout the County, identifying underserved areas that may benefit from mobile vending and farm stands offering <u>fresh and healthy food</u> . 20. Provide <u>model ordinances</u> , including data and tools for municipalities to conduct <u>Health Impact Assessment</u> as an integral component of the <u>planning process</u> . 21. Develop <u>model ordinances</u> that <u>define and allow small scale food production</u> on residential, commercial, industrial and public land.
