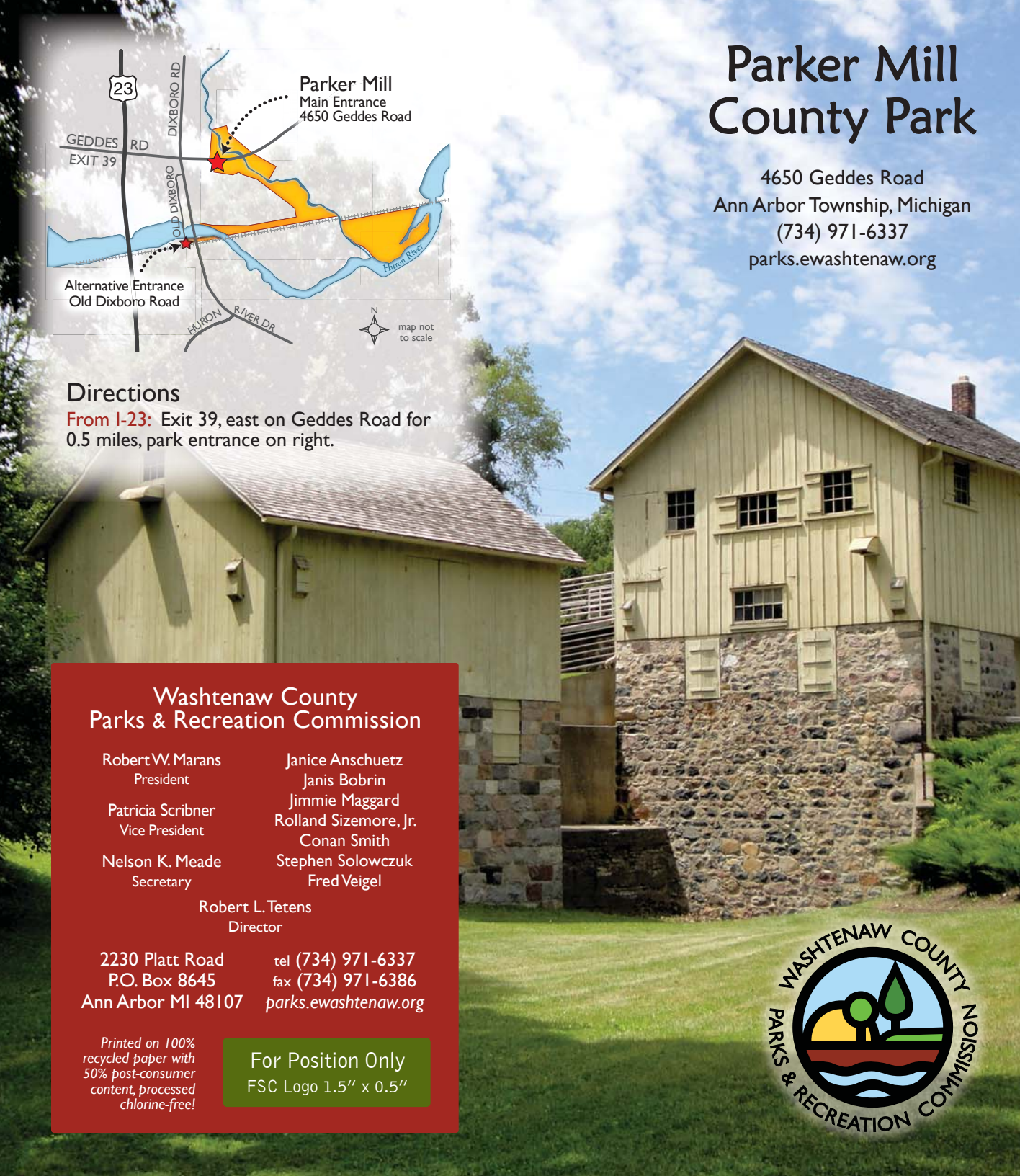


Award winning historical park nestled along the banks of Fleming Creek and the Huron River

Parker Mill County Park

Nestled along the banks of Fleming Creek and the Huron River, this 45-acre park is a favorite of both history buffs and nature lovers. The historic grist mill is the main attraction, standing as a reminder of the region's agricultural heritage.

History

Surviving as one of the oldest mills in Washtenaw County, Parker Mill is the last of at least 5 former mill

sites along Fleming Creek. It was named for the Parker family who built the grist mill in 1873 and the adjacent cider mill in 1887. For nearly 90 years the grist mill produced flour for the family's needs and for neighboring farms. In 1983, WCPARC acquired 26 acres of the former Parker farm, and with mill restoration completed in 1984, Parker Mill County Park opened to the public!

Today, the grist mill is operable and contains original milling machinery left behind when the Parkers ceased operations in the late 1950s. The cider mill has been converted into a small museum, and a restored log cabin, built in the 1870s, is also located on the property.

Pavilions

Visitor Pavilion: Open-air information center with interpretive panels, trail maps, picnic tables, seasonal restrooms & drinking fountain; barrier-free access.

Green Roof Pavilion: Vegetated roof helps with stormwater management and provides a unique learning opportunity; interpretive display adjacent to pavilion.

Picnicking

Picnic tables are available in the Visitor Pavilion, along the creek, and near the log cabin.

Trails

Shared-Use Trail: 0.75-mile paved trail connects to the City of Ann Arbor's Gallup Park and the Huron River Greenway Border-to-Border Trail.

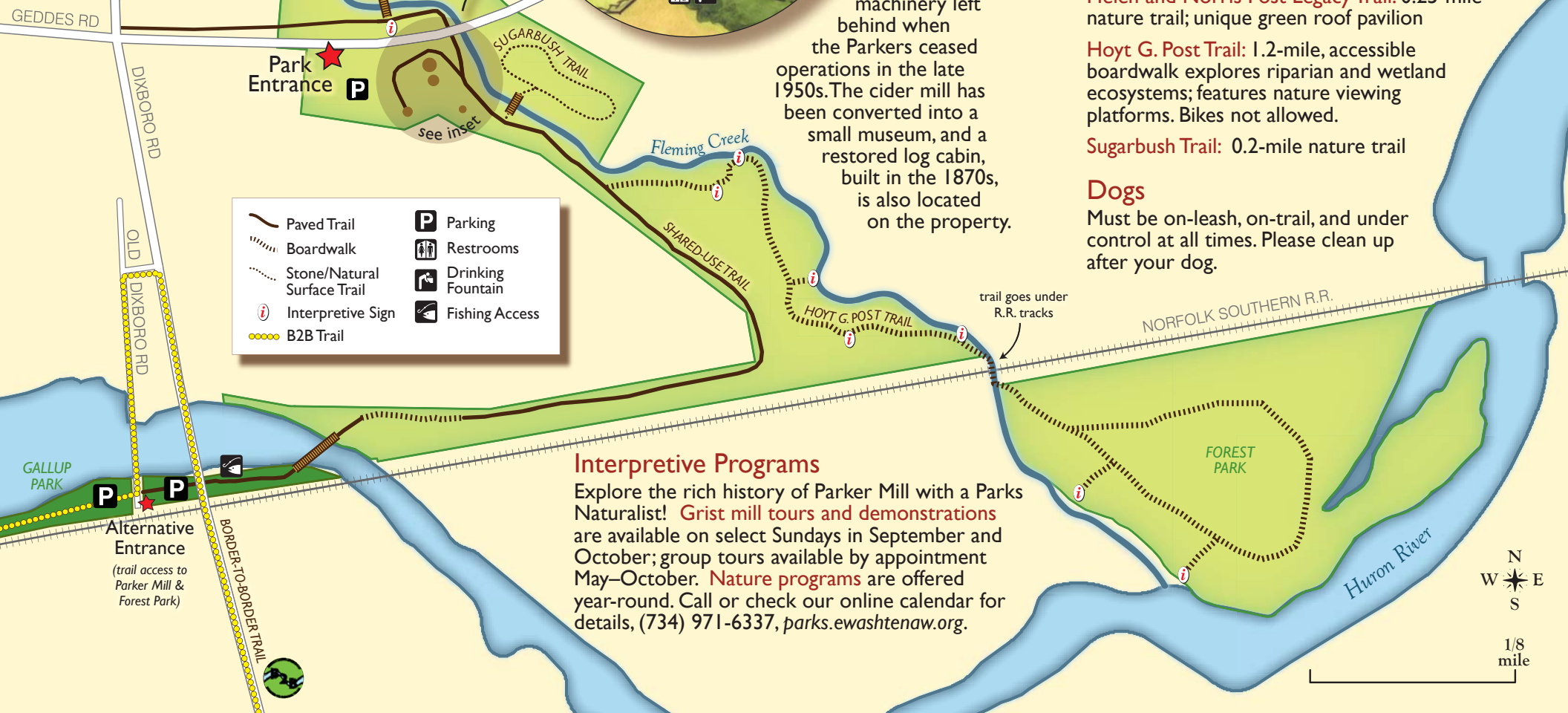
Helen and Norris Post Legacy Trail: 0.25-mile nature trail; unique green roof pavilion

Hoyt G. Post Trail: 1.2-mile, accessible boardwalk explores riparian and wetland ecosystems; features nature viewing platforms. Bikes not allowed.

Sugarbush Trail: 0.2-mile nature trail
